


# **Standards of Practice Framework**

Naturopathic Physician practice is diverse and complex. Both regulators and registrants need standards that will guide and set expectations for practice.

A standard is the minimum level of acceptable performance. It is an expected and achievable level of performance against which actual performance can be compared.

The framework below outlines three types of standards, all falling under the umbrella 'Standards of Practice' heading.



**Professional Standards** give clear expectations of what is historically expected of a professional. The general principles can apply to any professional but in this case are particular to NDs.

**Scope of Practice Standards** are based on the activities that NDs can carry out and defines what needs to be considered prior to carrying out these activities. In essence it considers, "I **can** do this but **should** I do it?"

**Practice Standards** expand on some of the requirements identified in the Professional Standards and provide more clarity on topics such as informed consent, record keeping, etc.

Together, the Standards of Practice set out the requirements for registrants and make expectations for practice clear and enforceable.

The **Professional Standards** have been developed and we provide them here. They describe the responsibilities of naturopathic physicians in providing care to the public in BC.

## **Patient-Centred Care**

- 1. Put the interests of patients before the interests of the naturopathic physician in providing safe, professional, quality patient care.
- 2. "Do no Harm".
- 3. Respect the patient's right to privacy and confidentiality.
- 4. Respect the patient's right and ability to make informed choices regarding their care.

#### Unique Body of Knowledge

- 1. Ensure the Therapeutic Order is the foundation of practice.
- 2. Base practice on a unique, scientifically based body of knowledge and expertise.
- 3. Practise according to evidence-based and peer-supported principles.

#### **Competent Application of Knowledge**

- 1. Competently apply knowledge in assessing, treating, and managing patient care.
- 2. Assess outcomes of care provided.
- 3. Maintain competence by undertaking continuous learning and professional development.

#### **Professional Ethics**

1. Practise in accordance with the ethical guidelines for the profession.

## Professional Responsibility and Accountability

1. Maintain accountability in the public interest.

- 2. Ensure that practice meets the legislative requirements and professional standards of the profession.
- Assume primary responsibility for maintaining own competence and fitness to practise.
