**Nature of Action:** On March 2, 2026, a Panel of the Inquiry Committee (the “Panel”) of the College of Complementary Health Professionals (the “College”) ordered suspension of Arthur Deluis RMT (the “Registrant”)’s practice of massage therapy pursuant to Section 35 of the *Health Professions Act*. This order varied a previous interim order issued on December 30, 2024 that imposed limitations and conditions on practice (the “[Original Interim Order](#)”).

**Legal Framework:** Section 35(1) of the *Act* authorizes the Panel to implement limits and conditions on practice to protect the public from harm before an investigation or discipline hearing is complete. This is not a final disposition, but an urgent, protective, and temporary measure that will remain in effect until the matter is concluded. Measures taken under section 35(1) of the *Act* pertain to allegations which are unproven unless admitted by a registrant or determined by the Discipline Committee.

**Reasons:** The Panel issued the Original Interim Order following the receipt of a complaint from a patient of the Registrant. The Panel found that there were allegations that, during the provision of treatment to the patient, the Registrant engaged in sexual misconduct. The Original Interim Order imposed limits and conditions to protect the public during the investigation or pending a discipline hearing. These limits and conditions can be found on the College’s website, at the link above.

During monitoring, the College identified evidence that the Registrant had failed to comply with the Original Interim Order, which was then presented to the Panel. The College did not receive complaints alleging any new instances of misconduct relating to patient harm while the Original Interim Order was in effect. The Panel also considered evidence that the Registrant changed his practice location from his clinic to his home, both located in Surrey, without notifying the College.

The Panel found that the updated information, particularly the non-compliance with the Original Interim Order, demonstrates that more stringent action is required to sufficiently address the risk to the public. The Panel concluded that suspension of the Registrant’s registration pending the disposition of this matter is necessary to protect the public.
