**Name:** Glenn Kukkee, former RMT

**Date of Action:** October 21, 2025

**Nature of Action:** On October 21, 2025, Glenn Kukkee, RMT (“Mr. Kukkee”), entered into an Undertaking and Consent Agreement pursuant to section 33(6)(c) and section 36(1) of the *Health Professions Act*, following an investigation by the College of Complementary Health Professionals of B.C.’s (“CCHPBC”) Inquiry Committee into allegations that Mr. Kukkee engaged in professional boundary violations which occurred between May 2015 and March 2018.

**Background:** At the time of the alleged events, Mr. Kukkee was a registrant of the College of Massage Therapists of British Columbia (“CMTBC”) prior to its amalgamation into CCHPBC.

On February 3, 2022, CMTBC received a public complaint involving allegations concerning events which took place between 2015 and 2018. Mr. Kukkee admitted that he engaged in ongoing professional boundary violations with a patient from 2015 to 2018. Mr. Kukkee admitted he developed a close personal relationship with a patient that included physical and sexual contact outside the treatment environment.

Mr. Kukkee’s registration with CCHPBC lapsed on December 31, 2024. He has not held practising status since January 3, 2023 (under CMTBC) and is currently not authorized to practice as a registered massage therapist in British Columbia.

**Resolution:** CCHPBC’s Inquiry Committee resolved to dispose of the matter by requiring that Mr. Kukkee undertake or consent to the following:

- A formal reprimand by CCHPBC.
- If Mr. Kukkee applies for and is successfully reinstated with CCHPBC,
  - an agreement not to repeat the conduct of,
    - Entering into a close personal relationship with a patient or former patient;



- Where there is a potential or actual boundary violation that cannot be adequately resolved, failing to terminate a therapeutic relationship in accordance with the College's Code of Ethics;
  - Hugging a patient inside or outside the treatment environment;
  - Exchanging gifts with a patient;
  - Disclosing personal information to a patient beyond what is required for the provision of patient care;
  - Presenting investment opportunities to a patient;
  - Failing to make and keep a current, accurate and complete health care record for a patient in accordance with CCHPBC Bylaws.
- a suspension of his registration with CCHPBC for a period of 6 months to be served consecutively with any other suspensions imposed on his registration.
- Payment of a portion of the costs of the investigation.

If Mr. Kukkee seeks to reinstate his registration with CCHPBC, such reinstatement will not automatically be granted. CCHPBC's Licensing Committee will evaluate his application for registration under the *Health Professions and Occupations Act* and CCHPBC Bylaws.

The Inquiry Committee is satisfied that this resolution is consistent with CCHPBC's mandate to serve and protect the public.
