Date of Action: October 21, 2025

Nature of Action: On October 21, 2025, Glenn Kukkee, RMT (“Mr. Kukkee”), entered into an Undertaking and Consent Agreement pursuant to section 33(6)(c) and section 36(1) of the *Health Professions Act*, following an investigation by the College of Complementary Health Professionals of B.C.’s (“CCHPBC”) Inquiry Committee into allegations that Mr. Kukkee engaged in professional boundary violations which occurred in 2015.

Background: At the time of the alleged events, Mr. Kukkee was a registrant of the College of Massage Therapists of British Columbia (“CMTBC”) prior to its amalgamation into CCHPBC.

On February 2, 2022, CMTBC received a public complaint involving allegations that Mr. Kukkee engaged in professional boundary violations during a massage therapy treatment that occurred in March 2015. The patient and Mr. Kukkee had an existing relationship prior to the treatment. Mr. Kukkee admitted that, during the treatment, he engaged in therapeutic touch that he did not clearly distinguish from his professional role.

Mr. Kukkee’s registration with CCHPBC lapsed on December 31, 2024. He has not held practising status since January 3, 2023 (under CMTBC) and is currently not authorized to practice as a registered massage therapist in British Columbia.

Resolution: CCHPBC’s Inquiry Committee resolved to dispose of the matter by requiring that Mr. Kukkee undertake or consent to the following:

- A formal reprimand by CCHPBC.
- If Mr. Kukkee applies for and is successfully reinstated with CCHPBC, an agreement not to repeat the conduct of,
 - failing to make and keep a health care record for a patient in accordance with CCHPBC Bylaws, and
 - failing to maintain professional boundaries in the context of a dual relationship.



- Payment of a portion of the costs of the investigation.

If Mr. Kukkee seeks to reinstate his registration with CCHPBC, such reinstatement will not automatically be granted. CCHPBC's Licensing Committee will evaluate his application for registration under the *Health Professions and Occupations Act* and CCHPBC Bylaws.

The Inquiry Committee is satisfied that this resolution is consistent with CCHPBC's mandate to serve and protect the public.
