**SUMMARY PROTECTION ORDER**

Pursuant to sections 126 and 259 of the *Health Professions and Occupations Act* [SBC 2022] c.43 and upon direction from a panel of the Investigation Committee, **THE REGISTRAR ORDERS THAT:**

**ELLE BRYSON, Massage Therapist** (the “Respondent”), has the following limits on her practice of massage therapy:

- a) The Respondent is not permitted to bring hypodermic needles, acupuncture needles, dry needles, Intramuscular Stimulation (IMS) needles, lancets, or any other tools or devices designed to puncture or break the skin into a clinic or any place where she provides massage therapy treatment;
- b) The Respondent is not permitted to perform any procedure which involves the breaking, piercing, or puncturing of the skin, or any procedure on tissue below the dermis while practicing as a registered massage therapist;
- c) The Respondent must immediately post a notice, in a prominent position, on all online booking pages associated with the Respondent the following statement:

Elle Bryson is not permitted to bring hypodermic needles, acupuncture needles, dry needles, Intramuscular Stimulation (IMS) needles, lancets or any other tools or devices designed to puncture or break the skin into a clinic or any place where she provides massage therapy treatment. Elle Bryson is also not permitted to perform any procedure which involves the breaking, piercing, or puncturing of the skin, or any procedure on tissue below the dermis while practicing as a registered massage therapist. These restrictions were imposed by order of the

- d) The Respondent must also immediately post in a prominent and visible place in any waiting room of any clinic where she provides massage therapy treatment a notice that is printed on 8 x 11 inch paper and in 14-point font or larger stating in English:

Elle Bryson is not permitted to bring hypodermic needles, acupuncture needles, dry needles, Intramuscular Stimulation (IMS) needles, lancets or any other tools or devices designed to puncture or break the skin into a clinic or any place where she provides massage therapy treatment. Elle Bryson is also not permitted to perform any procedure which involves the breaking, piercing, or puncturing of the skin, or any procedure on tissue below the dermis while practicing as a registered massage therapist. These restrictions were imposed by order of the Investigation Committee of the College of Complementary Health Professionals of British Columbia, dated June 8, 2026. 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- e) The Respondent must also post in a prominent place in any treatment room where she provides massage therapy treatment, a notice that is printed on 8x11 inch paper and in 14-point font or larger stating in English:

Elle Bryson is not permitted to bring hypodermic needles, acupuncture needles, dry needles, Intramuscular Stimulation (IMS) needles, lancets or any other tools or devices designed to puncture or break the skin into a clinic or any place where she provides massage therapy treatment. Elle Bryson is also not permitted to perform any procedure which involves the breaking, piercing, or puncturing of the skin, or any procedure on tissue below the dermis while practicing as a registered massage therapist. These restrictions were imposed by order of the



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- f) The Respondent must, by 6:00 p.m. every Friday, while these restrictions are in effect, provide the College with, or electronic access to, the Respondent's calendar, including the name and contact information for each patient she treated in the preceding week; and
- g) The Respondent will be subject to random on-site audits of her practice by a College-appointed inspector to ensure compliance with the orders of the Investigation Committee, with the frequency and timing of the random on-site audits to be at the sole discretion of the College. Without limiting the foregoing, an inspector may inspect any patient booking process (whether that occurs physically, by telephone, or otherwise electronically), any file or record of any patient treated by the Respondent and may contact the Respondent's patients.
