**CONSENT ORDER
(pursuant to section 158 of the HPOA)**

BY THE REGISTRAR:

WHEREAS:

- A. On June 5, 2024, pursuant to section 33 (4) (a), (b) and (c) of the Health Professions Act, RSBC 1996, c 183 (the “HPA”), the Inquiry Committee of the College of Massage Therapists of B.C. (“CMTBC”) initiated an investigation into concerns that Jinsong Li, RMT (the “Respondent”), did not disclose a complaint to the College of Massage Therapists of Ontario (“CMTO”) when renewing his registration with CMTBC for 2024 (the “Complaint”).
- B. On June 11, 2024, the Respondent was provided with notice of the investigation.
- C. On June 28, 2024, CMTBC amalgamated with three other health profession colleges to form the College of Complementary Health Professionals (the “CCHPBC”). Under part 2.01 of the HPA, CCHPBC became authorized to exercise any power and perform any duty under the HPA that CMTBC formerly exercised but did not complete prior to the amalgamation. Subsequently, on April 1, 2026, the HPA was repealed and replaced by the HPOA. Pursuant to section 428 of the HPOA, the Complaint continued under the provisions of the HPOA.
- D. The investigation was conducted in accordance with Part 3 of the HPA and Division 12 of the HPOA.



- E. The Investigation revealed the following:
- i. In May or June 2023, the Respondent became aware of a complaint made against him at CMTO.
 - ii. On December 3, 2023, the Respondent applied for renewal of his registration with CMTBC. As part of his renewal application, the Respondent selected "no" in response to the following declaration:

In the past year, I have been the subject of a complaint, investigation, disciplinary action or finding, including a consent resolution, by a regulatory or licensing body, relating to the practice of a profession.
- F. The Respondent was provided with an opportunity to respond to the investigation before CCHPBC's Investigation Committee deliberated on the disposition of the Complaint.
- G. On June 2, 2026, a panel of CCHPBC Investigation Committee assessed the Complaint pursuant to section 134 (2) (b) of the HPOA.
- H. Pursuant to section 136 of the HPOA, the Panel determined it had reasonable grounds to believe the Respondent committed an act of misconduct by making a false declaration on his 2024 CMTBC registration renewal application.
- I. Pursuant to section 136 (2) (a) of the HPOA, the Panel directed the Registrar to dispose of the Complaint by making an order with the Respondent's consent pursuant to section 158 of the HPOA.
- J. The Respondent consents to the making of this Consent Order pursuant to section 158 of the HPOA.
- K. The Respondent acknowledges that he has read and understood the terms of this Consent Order and was given the opportunity to seek independent legal advice before consenting to the terms of the order.



- L. The Respondent acknowledges that, in accordance with section 256 of the HPOA, the Registrar must publish the terms of the Disciplinary Order and the reasons for the Disciplinary Order.
- M. The Respondent acknowledges that a breach of the terms of this Consent Order constitutes misconduct pursuant to section 11 of the HPOA and any alleged breach may result in an investigation under the HPOA and lead to further regulatory consequences.

DISCIPLINARY ORDER

PURSUANT TO SECTION 158 (2) (b) AND 269 OF THE HPOA, THE REGISTRAR ORDERS THAT:

1. The Respondent acknowledges that he engaged in misconduct on December 5, 2023, and consents to a reprimand for the following conduct:
 - i. making a false declaration on his annual licensure renewal application by selecting "no" in response to the following declaration when he knew or ought to have known that his selection was incorrect:

In the past year, I have been the subject of a complaint, investigation, disciplinary action or finding, including a consent resolution, by a regulatory or licensing body, relating to the practice of a profession.
2. The Registrar accepts the Respondent's undertaking not to repeat the conduct of providing a false declaration on an application for licensure with the CCHPBC.
3. If the Respondent applies for and successfully reinstates his licensure with CCHPBC, within one month of his reinstatement, the Respondent must review the current CCHPBC Bylaws and Professional Standards and provide confirmation that he has done so to CCHPBC.
4. If the Respondent applies for and successfully reinstates his licensure with CCHPBC, within three months of his reinstatement,



the Respondent must successfully complete CCHPBC's Law, Ethics, and Professionalism course and report successful completion to CCHPBC.
