**CONSENT ORDER
(pursuant to section 158 of the HPOA)**

BY THE REGISTRAR:

WHEREAS:

- A. On April 3, 2024, the College of Traditional Medicine Practitioners and Acupuncturists of British Columbia (CTCMA) initiated an own motion investigation under s. 33(4) of the *Health Professions Act*, RSBC 1996, c 183 (the “HPA”), related to the billing practices of the Respondent Chin Ling (Eliza) Huang (the “Respondent”).
- B. On June 28, 2024, CTCMA amalgamated with three other health profession regulatory colleges to form the College.
- C. On April 5, 2024, the Respondent was provided with notice of the investigation regarding the Complaint.
- D. On April 1, 2026, the HPA was repealed and replaced by the HPOA. Pursuant to section 428 of the HPOA, the Complaint continued under the provisions of the HPOA.
- E. The investigation was conducted in accordance with Part 3 of the HPA and Division 12 of the HPOA.
- F. The Respondent was provided with an opportunity to respond to the investigation before the College’s Investigation Committee deliberated on the disposition of the Complaint.
- G. On July 2, 2026, a panel of the College’s Investigation Committee assessed the Complaint pursuant to section 134 (2) (b) of the HPOA.
- H. Pursuant to section 136 of the HPOA, the Panel determined it had reasonable grounds to believe the Respondent committed an act of misconduct by breaching the Ethical Practice and Professional Practice Standard, College Bylaws and the Practice Guidance on Billing and Insurance (in force at the time)



- a. Fraudulently issuing a receipt for acupuncture treatment when the Respondent did not provide any service to a patient;
 - b. Failing to protect her registration number by using it on a receipt for services not provided to a patient.
- I. Pursuant to section 136 (2) (a) of the HPOA, the Panel directed the Registrar to dispose of the Complaint by making an order with the Respondent's consent pursuant to section 158 of the HPOA.
 - J. The Respondent consents to the making of this Consent Order pursuant to section 158 of the HPOA.
 - K. The Respondent acknowledges that he has read and understood the terms of this Consent Order and was given the opportunity to seek independent legal advice before consenting to the terms of the order.
 - L. The Respondent acknowledges that, in accordance with section 256 of the HPOA, the Registrar must publish the terms of the Disciplinary Order and the reasons for the Disciplinary Order.
 - M. The Respondent acknowledges that a breach of the terms of this Consent Order constitutes misconduct pursuant to section 11 of the HPOA and any alleged breach may result in an investigation under the HPOA and lead to further regulatory consequences.

DISCIPLINARY ORDER

PURSUANT TO SECTION 158 (2) (b), 269, and 270 OF THE HPOA, THE REGISTRAR ORDERS THAT:

- 1. The Respondent acknowledges that they engaged in misconduct and consents to a reprimand for the following conduct:
 - a. Breaching the Ethical Practice and Professional Practice Standard, College Bylaws and the Practice Guidance on Billing and Insurance (in force at the time) by:
 - i. Fraudulently issuing a receipt for acupuncture treatment when the Respondent did not provide any service to a patient;
 - ii. Failing to protect her registration number by using it on a receipt for services not provided to a patient.



2. The Registrar accepts the Respondent's undertaking not to repeat the following conduct, which constitutes a breach of Principle 5 of the current Communication and Professionalism Professional Standard:
 - a. Fraudulently issuing a receipt for acupuncture treatment when the Respondent did not provide any service to a patient (Principle 5.2);
 - b. Failing to protect her registration number by using it on a receipt for services not provided to a patient (Principle 5.4).
3. Within one month of consenting to this order, the Respondent must review the current College Bylaws and Professional Standards, and report completion to the College.
4. Within nine months of consenting to this order, the Respondent must successfully complete, at her own cost, the course 217B Clinical Procedures: Medical Ethics & Legal Issues offered by the Tzu Chi International College of Traditional Chinese Medicine and provide written confirmation to the College.
